gather around a firebowl or just sit in the shade or out of the wind and rain yet closer to the trees. Most of the time it was just one person with Tony and Liz or Karen so we need to hear from you if this is something you would like us to continue with.

We know these kinds of things take a while to get established so we will wait to hear what you think.

## Clutter Coffin – Cathy Turbinskyj

*Some of you will have met our very dear friend Cathy at some of our events in the past. She is a woman of many talents - singer, artist, writer, lover of terrible jokes and very experienced gardener so you can imagine the mixed feelings we have sharing this article with you all.*

Phew. This September, 6 months after a diagnosis of Secondary Breast Cancer in March 2022, I finished decorating my cardboard coffin, and what a satisfying, pleasurable process it's been. It did feel like a race against time though, when for some weeks I was losing vision in my right eye, and I feared I was about to go blind (suspected brain tumour turned out to be only a bone tumour), (and right now, thanks to taking steroids, normal vision has been resumed).

With lots of advice and enthusiastic support from Liz and Adam, I chose and ordered the coffin and got to work on it, in a lovely sunny open stable at Westmill Farm. I have so enjoyed making the coffin a Home From Home...



decorating it with a collage of paper-cuts, cards and photos from family and friends (I photocopied a lot of them) that have surrounded me at home over the years,

continuing the Parcel theme that the shoe-box shape of the coffin suggested (Return To Sender!). I've lined it with a couple of familiar bedspreads, and my Coffin-Helpers have instructions to wrap me in my

bedding and quilt, with teddies, just like home. Inside are also dried moss roses and petals from my garden, a whoopee cushion, a little box containing the 4 back teeth I've had extracted over the years and saved to go back into the earth with me, and a box of ribbons, for pairs of people at my funeral to tie the coffin lid down securely. (A bit of an ice-breaker!).

It's felt like a Downsizing, from living at Clutter Cottage all these 29 years, to Clutter Coffin, my final resting place... Bed has always been my favourite refuge, and so my coffin, my final resting place, feels familiar, safe, comforting and all I'll need... And It's very beautiful! I've asked to be placed lying on my left side, just as I sleep, very Neolithic burial mound style.

All this I know is an indulgence - when I'm dead I won't know or care how my body's disposed of - but - it pleases me, and I've so enjoyed sharing the process with friends and a sister and brother-in-law who I think have found it helpful for them too, facing as they do the prospect of my death and burial. (I'd already booked a place up at the Burial Ground years ago, when you could still reserve a place).

If I sound very accepting of my illness and death, it's because I am. I'm 66, not 26, and it's hard to believe *The Best Is Yet To Come* (Grow Old With Me...). And I'll be spared the trials of

old age - who looks forward to that?!

The hard work in preparation for my decline and death was seeing to all the Admin Stuff. It was often stressful and a real brain-ache, but it's done now, phew. Sorted. I recommend the excellent *'Before I Go - The Essential Guide To Creating a Good End Of Life Plan'* by Jane Duncan-Rogers.

I think that all this being so pro-active and engaged around my death and funeral arrangements has been partly a way of maintaining an illusion of control. And now I've done almost all of the prep I want to (have yet

to design my *'Funeral Programme'* leaflet thing), I feel a flatness, and a depression after the high of these months since diagnosis... My coffin is finished and ready to go, I'm ready to go, so where are you Death?!

We're all in the same boat: we know we will die, and we don't know when, or how... I'm just feeling this challenge of living with uncertainty, acutely. How do I live the rest of my life? And the 64,000 dollar question: when the Bleep do I die? And exactly how?

Time for a nice pot of tea. Enjoy.

## Soil Song Nursery – Rebecca Brain

***I my nursery in Bishopstone village, in early Spring this year. I had spent many years developing my nursery-woman skills while I was working at Root and Branch; growing plants in a charity with adults who were experiencing mental health difficulties.***

I love growing plants from seed, cuttings, and divisions. The deep connection with the seasons of nature and the nurturing process of caring for tender new growth, adjusting warmth, light and water, pricking out and potting on and all the joy of bringing on a healthy vigorous plant to the point of sale. It's very much like bringing up thousands of children, all at once, all with their different needs and preferences!

The deeper ecological intention behind Soil Song is to grow plants without harm to nature. I use peat-free, certified Organic compost and natural seaweed granules, rather than chemical fertilisers. I use coconut coir pots, fairly traded with a women's co-

operative in Sri Lanka, or second hand re-used plastic pots. Almost everything I sell has been home-grown here in Bishopstone and delivered to the farm shop (next to the Royal Oak pub) by wheelbarrow.

I grow cottage garden perennials, all the old favourites. Also, herbs, annuals and veg plants, not to mention lots of native wildflowers, which are now thankfully really

popular with gardeners as we learn more about gardening with, and for, insect populations.

You can find my plants outside the Bishopstone stores, near the back entrance to the Royal Oak pub. Parking there is easy. The shop is open 7 days a week. You can also drop unwanted used plant pots of any size to the back of the shop and I will give them a new life!

There has been so much local support and enthusiasm for the nursery and it's ethos. I'm very grateful for all my growing loyal and dedicated customers, who share my care of this planet, the other beings who belong here, and the resources that sustain us all.
